The college has been providing quality education from past 53 years in this region. It has earned a goodwill due to a plethora of opportunities it provides. Apart from regular classroom education, our college promotes and supports a lot of extracurricular activities. Equal opportunities are given to both boys and girls to represent the college on various platforms at state and national level. It also provides opportunities to its teachers and non-teaching staff to advance their skill and knowledge by streamlining various training programmes.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The curriculum of our institution is effectively and efficiently planned as per the guidelines of the University. The college administration prepares well-constructed time table for each year/Semester for both UG and PG courses. The college deals with a wide range of programs. B.S. City College runs various courses such as B.Ed., Biotechnology, BBA and BCA. These self-financed courses give emphasis on the development of essential skills in their respective fields. At the beginning of an academic session, departmental meetings are held in every department. Topics in the syllabus are distributed to the respective teachers for both UG & PG courses after having discussions with them. Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The curriculum of our institution is effectively and efficiently planned as per the guidelines of the University. The college adheres to the directions laid down by the University. BOS (Board of Studies) of the University prepares and reviews the syllabi for various Programs keeping in the view- the objectives of the institution, interest of stake holders and national requirement, and the same is implemented after approval by the academic council. The college deals with a wide range of programs and courses that are relevant to the local needs and pertinent emerging national and global trends.

At the beginning of an academic session, departmental meetings are held in every department. Topics in the syllabus are distributed to the respective teachers for both UG & PG courses after having discussions with them. Number of classes for each topic is decided according to the syllabus and credits are assigned to each topic/Paper as per University guidelines. Various classroom teaching methods based on the need of different subjects are used for the effective delivery of the curriculum such as chalk and black board method, ICT – enabled teaching learning method, use of scientific models and charts. Group discussions among the students during the class, seminars by students related to curriculum are also arranged periodically.

The college administration prepares well constructed time table for each year/Semester for both UG and PG courses. With the emerging trend in the demand of vocational degrees, B.S. City College runs various courses such as B.Ed., Biotechnology, BBA and BCA. These self-financed courses give emphasis on the development of essential skills in their respective fields. The college provides diploma/Certificate /UG/PG courses through Nalanda Open University and IGNOU.

The college is conscious regarding its role in this semi-urban location and strives to focus on basic skills necessary for the upliftment of the society such as, educational excellence- where our students shall become intellectually strong, socially responsible and sensible towards fellow human beings, management skills and skills for entrepreneurship, research as well as building the spirit of team work. Students appear in the internal exam which is in the form of assignment or written test. After proper evaluation marks are shown in the classroom, always entered in the relevant department register and also send to the university in the prescribed format. On the basis of the date specified in the academic calendar, a transparent internal assessment procedure is carried out in the college. To ensure regularity of students in the classroom weightage is given to attendance and classroom performance of the students. Additional marks (five to ten) are given for regular attendance participation and performance in sports, cultural and other extracurricular activities like active membership of NCC and NSS. - 1. Vermicompost is the product of decomposition process using various species of worms like earthworms, to create a mixture of decomposing organic waste, bedding materials and vermicast. The process is called vermi composting. Bokaro Steel City College in its endeavor towards creating a clean and green campus has a well maintained site for vermi composting since 2016.

Benefits/Outcome:

This Bio-fertilizer with high nutrient composition has been serving to maintain the fertility of different gardens in the campus as well as helping in safe disposal of organic waste generated in the college.

2. Rainwater harvesting is the collection and storage of rain, preventing its runoff. Bokaro Steel City

College has set up a rain water harvesting system using the roof of a new building of library for surface collection. The water from the roof is collected through a network of pipelines and redirected to a tank. From there the water is directed to a deep pit with percolations to the main tank from where it can be pumped and used for various purposes like garden watering, toilet flushing etc. .

Benefits/Outcome:

The overflow is collected in a well and directed to the ground water. This helps to recharge the ground water and increase the level of water table. In this way the college contributes towards saving water and reducing surface runoff.

1. Clean & green Campus:

A clean and green campus where eco friendly practices and academics combine to promote sustainable and environment friendly campus has been maintained in Bokaro Steel City College . Important Clean and Green campus initiatives in Bokaro Steel City College campus are:

- 1. Rain water harvesting
- 2. Vermi composting
- 3. Use of solar power as an alternative source of energy for generation of electricity.
- 4. Use of LED lights
- 5. Digital Library.
- 6. Restricted entry of vehicles.
- 7. Plastic free campus.
- 8. Plantation landscaping with trees and plants all over the 20 acres expanse of the college.
- 9. Plants harboring wide variety of insects, birds, butterflies, reptiles etc.

Benefits/Outcome:

Such initiative help in creating an eco-friendly, less polluted environment in the campus, improves waste management, reduces excessive reliance on non renewable sources of energy and create a more balanced campus community. The beautifully landscaped campus has received appreciation in the form of "District Green Champion Certificate" awarded by Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education, Ministry of Education, and Govt. of India.

- **Curriculum development**: The institution adheres to the curriculum development standards set forth by BBMKU University, Dhanbad. The objectives and needs of the students are the main considerations when creating the curriculum
- Teaching and learning: Bokaro Steel City College is continuously and diligently working towards achieving new goals in teaching and learning with the advent of e-learning. The college is trying its best to motivate its teachers to contribute and render their services to e-contents like SWAYAM, NPTEL, etc. The college implemented the online teaching, learning, and working technique as the COVID-19 danger persisted, shattering the old teaching model. The college's employees and students embraced this development. Classes were taught digitally while the school was under lockdown utilising online tools like Google Classroom, Edmodo, Teachmint, WhatsApp, etc. Study materials were shared in text, jpeg, and pdf forms. Online internal evaluation was also carried out, with students submitting their assignments to the appropriate departments via Gmail. Undergraduate and graduate admission was handled through the chancellor's portal, where forms had to be filled out electronically within the specified time frame. To maintain the institution's smooth operation and to share the college's safety staff, virtual meetings were held.
- Examination and Evaluation: Instead of concentrating primarily on term-end exams, Bokaro Steel City College's assessment method exposes students to ongoing review. This system also puts the onus on the students to perform consistently and not study in a sporadic manner.
- **Research and Development:** In accordance with the standards and guidelines established by the University, Bokaro Steel City College offers all the assistance needed for its professors and students to engage in research and development across a variety of subjects.
- Library, ICT and Physical infrastructure/ Instrumentation: The library of Bokaro Steel City College is fully stocked with books, journals, and magazines covering practically all subjects. The library is updated from time to time. There is a reading room where the instructors and students can take advantage of looking through literature on various topics.

ICT: The college is close to creating highly advanced ICT, which is used for administrative assistance, student enrollment, content delivery, and sharing linked to various programmes held at the college level through NSS.

Infrastructure: The RUSA/State Government built a multipurpose hall and a reading room on the campus.

• **Human Resource Management:** Welfare hostels for boys and quarters for the staff working are provided in the college. A common room for female students with facilities for indoor sports and a sufficient number of washrooms is provided. The college also boasts a canteen, which provides healthy and hygienic food.

Industry interaction/ Collaboration: The students of Biotechnology, BBA, BCA, and B.Ed. participate in Internship Programmes organized by different Government as well as Private Research Institutions every year. The Students of other stream are also encouraged to participate in such internship programmes.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The college is very supportive of teaching and non-teaching staff and their overall welfare. The following benefits are provided to the teaching and non-teaching staffs:

- The mentor-mentee programme is followed in the college as it bridges the gap between the faculties and students as well as among the faculties. Senior teachers serve as mentors to junior or newly appointed teachers regarding various faculty development programmes, such as faculty induction programme, Refresher courses, etc. The mentee is free to approach the mentor for both educational as well as personal guidance.
- The College offers provisions for utilising all government programmes, including the ability to cash in earned leave, maternity leave, medical care, etc. For professional growth and advancement of the teaching staff, there is a provision for duty leave for teachers to attend FDP (Faculty Development Programme) events such as Orientation Programmes and Refresher courses, short-term courses, seminars, workshops, etc.
- The University established the Employees Welfare Fund (EWF) to offer financial support to the teaching and non-teaching workers. Every month, a minimum contribution of 10 to 50 rupees is made. In an emergency, employees may borrow up to one lakh from this fund.
- The college has provided tangible benefits such office space for personnel (teaching and non-teaching), and Wi-Fi facilities for staff.
- The college administration aims to rectify all the problems related to the faculty and non-teaching staff members by taking quick and beneficial measures to solve the problem.
- For all complaints and grievances from students and employees, there is a Grievance Redressal Cell
- For the entertainment of the teaching and non-teaching employees, an annual picnic is held.
- Women's Cell is set up with the aim of creating a gender-sensitized community within the college.
- The faculty members are encouraged to write books and publish research articles.
- The Career Advancement Scheme is followed for promotion of teaching staff.
- All the non-doctoral faculty members are encouraged to get enrolled in part-time Ph.D. programmes.
- Faculties are provided with spacious cabins in which storage space is also available.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources:

Institutional plans for raising money and making the most use of available resources: The state government, UGC, and RUSA are the college's main financing sources because it is a government institution. The following are the funding sources:

- The government pays the wages of both regular and guest teachers.
- RUSA grants and funds are kept in a separate bank account and applied to the projects they were intended for, such as new construction or renovation of existing structures.
- A separate account is kept for the special fee money that students paid at the time of admission.

Utilisation of Funds

- The departments seek quotations from vendors for the purchase of equipment, computers, books, etc. The quotes are carefully examined before a choice is made based on factors like cost, value, terms of service, etc.
- The budgetary allocation is checked by the principal, the bursar, and the accounting department.
- Expenses are paid for the objectives for which the aforementioned funds are intended, and proper records of the bills are kept.
- Savitribai Jyotirao Phule Fellowship for Single Girl Child (SJSGC): Students of our college are also benefactors under this fellowship. The amount is directly transferred to their respective bank accounts.
- e-Kalyan NSP Portal: Students get scholarships under this programme. The amount is transferred directly to the students' accounts only after verification from the college.
- Hostel Funds: There are three hostels in the college, viz., the minority hostel, the boys' hostel, which has been constructed with the help of funds provided by the Welfare Department, and the girls' hostel with the UGC Fund.
- Contingency: Our College receives monthly contingencies of Rupees Thirty Thousand and Rupees Forty Thousand only for office and laboratory, respectively.
- Buildings for BBA and BCA courses have been constructed using funds from RUSA.

Resource mobilization policy and procedures are as follows:

- The UGC Committee closely collaborates with the Council and the IQAC to oversee the mobilisation of funds and ensure that they are used for the intended purpose.
- The accounts department ensures that purchases are made legally and in accordance with the rules.
- The Library Advisory Committee ensures that the library's resources are used to their full potential.
- The Department of Botany is responsible for maintaining and care of our botanical garden.
- The NSS team keeps an eye on the cleanliness of the campus and how it is used.
- The Principal gives instructions to ensure the best use of resources.
- Resource mobilization through Governmental/Non-governmental agencies- Water purifiers cum coolers through the CSR Policy of BPSCL.
- Installation of solar panels through JREDA (Jharkhand Renewable Energy Development Agency).
- Water purifiers donated by Punjab National Bank, fans donated by Union Bank of India.
- Corpus fund is generated through various means:
- Rented space is provided within the college campus to IGNOU.
- Road construction inside the campus funded by local administration.
- Income generated through disposal of old newspapers, magazines and books.
- Renting of multipurpose hall to various agencies.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Response:

The goals of IQAC are to guarantee the institution's ongoing improvement, to make sure that stakeholders are all involved in education, to create a quality system for deliberate, consistent, and planned action to enhance the institution's performance in academics and management, and lastly, to advocate for actions that will improve institutional performance and institutionalise best practices.

Bokaro Steel City College, Bokaro, is dedicated to providing students with a high-quality education through its innovative, all-encompassing, flexible, and complete educational philosophy. All facets of how the institute operates are covered by the operations performed by its Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The college's IQAC was created on November 12th, 2014, and has been regularly carrying out its tasks ever since. The Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR), Self Study Reports of different accreditations (SSR), Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS), Career Advancement Scheme

(CAS), Stakeholders (Guardians and students) feedback, etc., are prepared and evaluated by the college IQAC.

Practices initiated by the IQAC are as follows:

- The college has adopted three villages: Bhatua, Chouphatand, and Lewatand. The college's teachers and staff are divided into groups for visits to the adopted villages. The pandemic prevented these groups from visiting the villages, but NSS volunteers and NCC cadets of the college, escorted by their programme officers and NCC officers, respectively relentlessly, carried out the community work, which largely benefited these villages.
- During the second wave, when the Pandemic was at its worst, our institution likewise took the initiative to organize a vaccination programme. The college was effective in acting as a vaccination centre because of the NSS Programme Officer's and volunteers.
- The teaching-learning environment has been significantly enhanced by the IQAC's successful efforts to integrate ICT tools and alternative energy sources, such as the installation of solar panels and the upgrading of Wi-Fi, into the administrative operations of the Institutions.
- IQAC has developed an online Performa of a student satisfaction survey and student feedback to gather information from the students to strengthen the quality of the teaching-learning environment and to improve the performance of the teachers. Nevertheless, the students' identities remain concealed from the teachers.
- IQAC proposes to initiate green practices to maintain an eco-friendly college campus through activities like tree plantations, plastic free campus, and a clean and beautiful campus. A green audit was held by the IQAC, which covered a wide range of areas, including energy usage and management, water usage and management, organic waste management, pollution control, green initiatives, sustainability practices, etc.
- IQAC initiates resource mobilization through government and non-governmental agencies.
- Initiation of Internship Programmes for students of all the streams.
- Encouraging teachers to participate in Faculty Development Programmes like Refresher and Orientation Courses.
- Informing the teachers about various career advancement schemes.
- Helping and initiating to organize seminar and webinars.

Response:

Students learn to collaborate with each other irrespective of the socio-economic and cultural background.

• NCC and NSS activities- Cadets and Volunteers learn to imbibe social values by engaging themselves in social work. They identify their obligation towards the nation and the society and act as a link between the college and the society.

- **Reservation-** our college follows the provision of Reservation while admitting students in any course. Educators also come from different backgrounds and identity.
- Safety- we ensure safety for all, especially girls. We follow zero toleration for abuse, hate or bullying. Students are allowed to express their views freely. We have Women's Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Internal Complaints Committee and Cultural Program Cell to ensure safety and inclusion.
- We also celebrate and/or observe **commemorative days**. These are:
- * International Women's Day- It is celebrated to ensure Women's empowerment.
- *International Non-Violence Day- This day is observed to spread social awareness and prevent the students from using or supporting violence and understand it's negative impact on individual, family and society.
- * National Festivals- Independence Day and Republic Day are celebrated with huge enthusiasm in our college. Students and staff participate in this occasion with a sense of nationhood; it is a day to rise above one's caste, creed, race and sex. Parade is displayed by NCC cadets; it is a display of discipline and patriotism which inculcated the same in the viewers.
- * Van Mahotsava- message of clean and green environment is conveyed in Van Mahotsava. Different cultures view nature differently; hence, it is important in building solidarity among students. Swachh Bharat Internship was also carried on to promote pollution free environment.
- * Protest against Pulwama attack- country was agitated after Pulwama attack. This anger was channelized into a protest so as to exhibit the same in a positive and non-violent way *Surgical Strike Day- This day was also observed to withhold national integration
- *Yoga day- To ensure mental and physical wellbeing of all yoga sessions are held in college
- * **Voters Day-** we live in a democratic country where each citizen has the right to vote and participate in the making of government. Students are made aware of their right to vote.
 - **Social Responsibility-** Our college regularly visits the three adopted villages for cleanliness drive. During Covid-19 NCC and NSS Volunteers helped to spread Covid awareness. They helped the villagers to download '**Arogyasetu**' app. Mask distribution was also carried out in Petarwar. The aim was to reach maximum number of people possible.

These are the measures used to protect and celebrate cultural, regional, communal, linguistic, and socioeconomic diversities in our college.

7.2 Best Practices

- 1. **Title of the practice -** Clean and Green Campus
- 2. **Objective of the practice -** the objective of clean and green initiative is to instill environmental consciousness among the students, teachers and non-teaching staff of the college. They learn to

- respect and protect nature and understand that every living thing, including nature, has an environmental right and they need to be protected.
- 3. **The context -** In the college cleanliness drives are ensured through NSS Volunteers and NCC Cadets. In the college campus pavement, classrooms and corridors, are free from litter. Use of dustbins is also encouraged. Garden waste is dumped into compost pit for decomposition. The manure thus produced is used back in the garden. Efforts are made to save energy overuse and wastage of electricity is checked at every step. Solar energy is used instead of fuel generators. These are the few measures which we follow in order to achieve sustainable development goals.
- 4. **The practice** Following initiatives have been taken by our college to ensure clean and green campus-
- *Energy conservation use of energy saving bulbs and other electronics are insured. Classroom norms of switching off fans and lights is ensured before leaving the class.
- *Rain water harvesting There is provision for rainwater harvesting in our college campus. The stored rain water is used for gardening and other purposes.
- *Plantation Our college runs plantation drives on a regular basis. On every World Environment Day, trees and ornamental shrubs are planted.Bokaro Steel City College takes pride in the plantation and maintainance of an endangered and rare plant species "Kalptaru" (*Adansonia digitata*). Small gardens are also maintained.
- 5. **Evidence of success** When one enters our college campus one can see the lush green campus. Trees provide fresh air and natural shade. Flowering plants fill the environment with happiness and positivity. It is like a natural habitat for birds, insects and other small creatures.
- 6.**Problems encountered and resources required** lack of man-power is the major problem that we have encountered. More hands are required for an efficient environmental management.

We observe their situation and the locality in which they live and try to understand the problems faced by the villagers. We inform them about governmental schemes so that maximum number of beneficiaries can access them.
- 4. **The practice** NCC cadets and NSS volunteers, under the supervision of teachers and staff of our college, visit these three villages on a regular basis. They run cleanliness drives, Generate awareness regarding the importance of hand hygiene, etc. to promote health and hygiene.
- 5. **Evidence of success** NCC cadets and NSS volunteers and their coordinators have been provided certificates of appreciation by SDO Chas and BBMKU for their admirable effort.

6. **Problems encountered and resources required** – Non-cooperation by the villagers is the problem that we often encounter. Their reluctance in addressing their problems frankly hinders us from achieving the desired result and reaching maximum number of beneficiaries.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Bokaro Steel City College gives more priority to promote education to students coming from rural areas. Due to financial instability, local students cannot afford their education in the urban colleges; therefore, our college provides an academic environment to such students so that they can become educated. In order to encompass the holistic development of the students, the college encourages them to participate in extracurricular activities like NSS, NCC and sports.

The teachers, students and staff of the college take great pride in fulfilling their social responsibilities. It is said that charity begins at home. Keeping in view this proverb, the students and staff of the college are very particular in maintaining cleanliness and greenery in the campus and nearby areas as well. Wastage and overuse of electricity and water is also checked. Classroom and campus norms like switching off lights and fans before leaving the class and closing the tap water properly is followed. If bathrooms and pipes are leaking the students of the college feel that it is their duty to report the matter to the concerned authorities. It is through these small activities that the students and the staff members of college fulfill their social obligations.

In its endeavour to cater the needs of the community the college has adopted three villages BHATUA, CHOUPHAND, and LEWATAND. The teachers and non-teaching staff of the college have formed three different groups each headed by a group leader and to visit the adopted villages. The team focused attention on the problems faced by the villagers regarding education lack of sanitation and hygiene, problems and difficulties faced by small scale industries (e.g., bangle making) running within some of the village households. The problems were not just highlighted but a report for the same was submitted by the respective teams to the Principal, Bokaro Steel City College, Bokaro and a copy of the report was also forwarded to the deputy commissioner of Bokaro Steel City. NSS volunteers and NCC cadets regularly visit the three villages for plantation, cleanliness awareness drives etc.

In line with its vision of contributing towards the socio-economic development of the country, Bokaro steel city has taken utmost care in promoting health and wellbeing of the society at large. NSS and NCC unit of the college undertake a plethora of events to fulfill this purpose such as:

- Repeated blood donation camps are a regular feature in the college. Physically fit students and staff who have no history of any kind of ailment donate blood voluntarily to the Red Cross society.
- NCC cadets and NSS volunteers are also involved in sanitation drives in and around the city premises.
- NCC cadets visit hospitals and clean the hospital compound as well as benches in the waiting area.
- NSS volunteers, students and teachers make regular visits to the adopted villages to make the villagers aware of the benefits of sanitation, health and hygiene.
- SWACHTA ABHIYAN was carried on in Bhatua village by NSS volunteers. The school children of primary government school of this village where specially targeted in order to inculcate the culture of social hygiene among their family members.
- For both physical and mental health, Yoga sessions were arranged for the villagers.
- A veterinary doctor was hired to promote Animal husbandry and provide proper guidelines for their livelihood and employment.
- Mental health is an area of increasing concern in the society. A clinical psychologist was invited for the villagers to help them to socialize, increase their self-confidence and sense of self-worth.
- NSS volunteers also sprinkled bleaching powder in the open drains and encouraged the villagers to cover open drains using local materials like wood planks.
- The villagers were educated about proper segregation of domestic waste under the category SUKHA KACHDA and GILA KACHDA.
- Practical demonstration of the process of composting was also performed by NSS volunteers; they also taught the pre-school children the art of card making and rakhi making.
- Soap was distributed among the villagers in order to highlight the importance of hand hygiene. Students went door to door spreading the message of clean environment green environment.
- Local indigenous plants and trees like Mahua (*Madhuca longifolia*), Sal (*Shorearobusta*), Mahogany (*Swietenia macrophylla*), Amaltas (*Cassia fistula*), Chitwan (*Alstoniascholaris*), Neem (*Azadirachta*) etc. were selected for plantation in order to highlight the importance of conservation of indigenous plants so that they can be preserved and protected from extinction. These plants survive very well in the local habitat and are sustainable as well as economically viable. These plants are specially recognized for their high level of oxygen releasing capacity.
- The students and staff members of the college are wholeheartedly dedicated in spreading general awareness in the community. On the occasion like Safety Day, the NCC cadets campaigned to spread traffic awareness. In this drive they motivated civilians to value their life as well as of the others by following traffic rules and responsibilities.
- NCC cadets also participated in programs held at the SDO office to generate awareness about the importance of voting and thereby fulfilling their duties in framing of our democratic nation.
- NSS students campaigned for various programs such as SWASTH GRAMIN ABHIYAN and GANDAGI MUKT BHARAT ABHIYAN(Garbage free India) in which they actively participated by cleaning the Garga bridge area of Bokaro district.
